### Mission Statement

The Office of Agricultural Law Enforcement is dedicated to protecting Florida's agriculture and its consumers through professional law enforcement.

### Major Functions

The Office of Agricultural Law Enforcement is responsible for enforcing laws relating to the Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services and has jurisdiction over violations of law which threaten the overall security and safety of Florida's consumers and Florida's agriculture industry. The Office of Agricultural Law Enforcement supports the Department's various divisions in the enforcement of their specific statutes as well as the enforcement of other applicable criminal laws. The Office of Agricultural Law Enforcement is organized into four areas: the Bureau of Uniform Services, the Bureau of Investigative Services, the Bureau of Administrative Services, and the Agricultural Emergency Preparedness Section.

The Bureau of Uniform Services is responsible for operating the agency's 23 interdiction stations 24 hours a day, 365 days a year. Twenty-two of the stations are located along the Suwannee and St. Mary's Rivers, natural boundaries to Florida's major agricultural production areas; the last station is located on Interstate 10, just east of the Florida/Alabama state line. Through the enforcement of criminal and agricultural laws, rules, and regulations, the Office of Agricultural Law Enforcement ensures the public receives quality products while protecting the agricultural industry against the introduction of potentially devastating plant or animal pests and diseases.

The Bureau of Investigative Services has two operating sections: the Criminal Investigative Section and the Regulatory Investigative Section, which employ sworn and non-sworn investigators respectively. The Bureau of Investigative Services is responsible for the investigation of civil and criminal matters that the Department has jurisdiction over and incidents occurring on property owned or managed by the Department. Investigators are also responsible for investigating and enforcing criminal laws relating to consumer protection. The thirteen members of the Regulatory Investigative Section were transferred to the Bureau of Investigative Services from the Division of Consumer Services during the 2011 Legislative Session; this section presently remains funded by the Division of Consumer Services. The Bureau of Investigative Services manages fourteen Conservation and Recreation Land (CARL) officers funded by the Florida Forest Service. The Bureau of Investigative Services employs one law enforcement investigator II who is dedicated to supporting aquaculture activities.

The Bureau of Administrative Services provides organizational support to the employees of the Office of Agricultural Law Enforcement. The Bureau of Administrative Services oversees personnel activities, fiscal functions, records management, supplies, fleet management, department inventory, data services and computer support, training, and accreditation. Additionally, the Bureau of Administrative Services manages the Domestic Marijuana Eradication Program, a federally-funded system which directly supports local and state law enforcement agencies in the detection, dismantling, and eradication of domestically grown marijuana.

The Agricultural Emergency Preparedness Section provides professional expertise and leadership in statewide

homeland security and emergency preparedness issues involving agricultural and food systems. The Agricultural Emergency Preparedness Section coordinates and reviews appropriate department programs and activities related to agricultural emergencies and food defense for Florida's citizens. It is responsible for analysis and evaluation of threats to animal and plant agriculture and to the food production, processing, storage, and transportation systems. The Agricultural Emergency Preparedness Section acts as a primary liaison and contact for department-wide homeland security and emergency preparedness issues with other state and local agencies, federal government agencies, private and government laboratories, and diverse agriculture and food-related industries.

The Office of Inspector General (OIG) exists pursuant to F.S. 20.055, with responsibility to enhance the accountability, integrity, efficiency and effectiveness of the Department's operations by providing independent examinations and evaluations of the programs, activities, and resources. This is achieved through the functions of internal audits, special projects, management reviews conducted on programs within the Department. The OIG is responsible for audit coverage for the Department's \$1 billion budget including oversight of federal grant money and federally funded programs. The OIG also provides administrative and criminal investigative services to the entire Department comprised of approximately 4,200 employees assigned to various divisions and offices.

The Chief of the Bureau of Administrative Services is currently a sworn position that will be eliminated through attrition.

Evidence, training, and fleet management duties are presently performed by sworn members.

The Office of Agricultural Law Enforcement has the following regional configurations: the Bureau of Investigative Services personnel are divided into 7 Regions and are housed in 33 locations, including CARL Officers, an AES Investigator, and Regulatory Investigators (Attachment B); the Bureau of Uniform Services personnel are divided into 4 regions and are housed in 25 locations (Attachment C); the Bureau of Administrative Services personnel and Command Staff are all housed at the Office of Agricultural Law Enforcement Headquarters in Tallahassee.

Overall, the Office of Agricultural Law Enforcement has employees working in 56 facilities throughout the state (excluding those employees that work out of their homes). The locations, numbers of personnel assigned, and whether a facility is owned or leased are detailed in Attachment A.

The Office of Agricultural Law Enforcement currently has 21 support staff employees: 18 are assigned to the Office of Agricultural Law Enforcement Headquarters in Tallahassee; 3 civilians are assigned to the White Springs Regional Office. Support staff consists of the following positions:

Due to several years of budget cuts and position reductions, most civilian support positions have been modified to include tasks conducted by positions that were eliminated; therefore, most positions are serving multiple roles. The ratio of civilian support to sworn employees is 1 civilian support staff for every 13 sworn employees.

The Office of Agricultural Law Enforcement currently has no legal staff assigned, and must utilize resources from the Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services' Office of General Counsel for legal review of directives and practices.

Policies and procedures are crafted, reviewed, processed, and distributed through the Bureau of Administrative Services, and are under the direction of the Accreditation Manager to ensure compliance with Florida law enforcement accreditation standards. Written directives are distributed to employees via an electronic policy distribution system (PowerDMS) currently contracted through an outside vendor (IDS). The Office of Agricultural Law Enforcement has over 80 distributed written directives specifically addressing our mission and protocols.

The Office of Agricultural Law Enforcement (OALE) is responsible for protecting Florida's agricultural economy and its consumers. This is accomplished through a professional police force conducting regulatory inspections on loads of agricultural, horticultural, aquacultural and livestock commodities entering and leaving the state. These inspections are conducted at stations which are located at the natural boundary formed by the Suwannee and St. Mary's rivers in Northeast Florida and at a station located in Pensacola, Florida. This natural border allows OALE to concentrate its inspections in a way that protects the primary production area of Florida's tomato, avocado and citrus industries, as well as the equine industry in Ocala and the bovine industry throughout the southern counties. These inspections ensure that produce that leaves Florida meets certain Federal Marketing requirements and has been properly graded and inspected to ensure that a marketable and wholesome product reaches the consumer. OALE further ensures that pests and diseases are prevented from entering Florida's production area that could devastate certain segments of the industry, an industry that produces over 100 billion dollars of economic prosperity to the state of Florida each year. Compliance checks conducted also ensure that food products which enter and leave the state are transported at the proper temperature and in compliance with industry standards. If product fails to meet these criteria, it is prevented from entering into the food stream and thereby preventing possible food related illnesses. OALE also partners with the Florida Department of Revenue to collect bills of lading on items purchased elsewhere for use in Florida that may have Florida use tax due. This program recovers significant lost revenue monthly, which helps to ensure a level playing field for Florida based contractors as well as ensuring compliance with Florida taxation laws.

The Office of Agricultural Law Enforcement has 216 vehicles in its fleet. Attachment D, OALE Fleet Inventory, contains information regarding the vehicle year, make, and model as well as vehicle assignments broken down by bureau.

Much of the maintenance and repair work that is performed on the Office of Agricultural Law Enforcement's fleet is performed by the automotive equipment mechanic who is housed at the White Springs Regional Office. This includes all major and minor repairs and preventative maintenance for vehicles assigned to BUS Regions 1-3; major repairs for vehicles assigned to BUS Region 4; preventative maintenance for vehicles assigned to BIS Region 3 and a portion of BIS Region 2; and all major repairs and sting vehicle certification for vehicles assigned to BIS Regions 1-7.

As of this report, the Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services (DACS) does not have a policy regarding vehicle replacement; a policy is being drafted but it is not available at this time. Vehicles are currently replaced in accordance with guidelines established by the Department of Management Services (DMS).

The Office of Agricultural Law Enforcement (OALE) currently employs two FTE's and one contract position in support of all information technology (IT) functions within OALE. These positions function as first level support for all strategic and non-strategic functions for all OALE personnel throughout the state.

Although not directly responsible for network communications, this group still acts as first level support for all network issues in the field, and tries to solve the problems before handing them over to the Department's network team.

The group supports and administrates the following strategic applications:

1. ACISS case management system/Off the Shelf software
2. Commerce Transport Imaging System which tracks shipments of regulated products passing through 23 Inspection stations/Proprietary, integrated with other DACS divisions
3. Bill of Lading imaging, a joint interagency program with DOR to collect use taxes on freight passing through 23 Inspection stations/Proprietary
4. Tag and Container alert system which checks for stolen vehicle tags and shipping containers / Proprietary – queries FCIC/NCIC

In addition, other non-strategic applications which are supported include:

4. Skills Manager software
5. Field Training Officer software
6. Access to CJNET, FCIC, NCIC, DAVID, etc. for certified users

In addition to administration and support of software, the three personnel also troubleshoot hardware problems, are responsible for procuring, configuring and installing new equipment, reconfiguring spare equipment, and replacing malfunctioning equipment at the inspection stations within a 24 hour period.

The Office of Agricultural Law Enforcement (OALE) Bureau of Investigative Services (BIS) has 48 sworn FTE's. Although each of these employees has the potential to work cases that could be considered environmental, BIS has 14 uniformed CARL officers who are dedicated to the patrol of state lands and one law enforcement investigator II who is dedicated to aquaculture related activities.

**AQUACULTURE RELATED:**

Statutory and Rule Reference: CH. 597, 253.02, 379.361(5) FAC 5L:

The Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services Division of Aquaculture regulates aquaculture facilities, shellfish processing plants, and shellfish harvesting waters, oversees a restoration program for oyster reefs, and leases submerged state lands for aquaculture.

The investigator assigned to aquaculture activities works in a uniformed capacity conducting land and water patrols to prevent and detect criminal activity and ensure compliance of regulations governing harvest and processing. Specific areas of concern include harvest and movement of products; trespassing and lease protection; theft of products, vandalism and criminal mischief, and unfair and deceptive trade practices.

Underwater leases currently exist in Cedar Key, Ft. Myers, Volusia and Franklin County areas.

**STATE LANDS PROGRAM:**

Statutory and Rule Reference: Ch 253.02, 253.034, 259, 261, 589, 590, and FAC: 5I-4.

In addition to the statutory and rule references listed above specific to State Lands, Officers also enforce applicable Wildlife Rules and Regulations, applicable traffic laws, 403.413 Florida Litter Law, 536, 585 as it relates to health certificates and movement of animals on the property, and all applicable criminal laws found chapters 775 through 896.

The Florida Forest Service currently manages 35 State Forest Properties consisting of 1,058,149 acres which are located throughout the state. By law, these properties are managed under the multiple use concept offering a variety of recreational opportunities.

Recreational Opportunities afforded vary by property but may include: camping, water sports, hiking, horseback riding, bicycle riding, motorcycle riding in authorized areas only, fishing and hunting. The Division of Forestry documented 1,999,217 users of the various properties during FY 10-11.

BIS manages 14 uniformed officers funded through the Florida Forest Service (CARL Program) who are assigned to specific State Forest properties. These Officers provide a patrol function on their assigned forest property. While CARL Officers have the authority to enforce wildlife rules and regulations, their primary emphasis is in patrolling designated use areas and areas known to be used for unlawful activity to ensure compliance of all laws and rules governing the property.

The Office of Agricultural Law Enforcement (OALE) currently has one civilian employee assigned to the accreditation function as one of several tasks assigned (most other tasks are unrelated to the accreditation process), and one bureau chief that manages the accreditation process in addition to other responsibilities. Various other employees provide assistance as needed for creating, reviewing, disseminating, and archiving written directives, as well as submitting various documents to verify proof of compliance with policies and accreditation standards.

OALE was initially accredited with the Commission for Florida Law Enforcement Accreditation in 2007 and was reaccredited in 2010. As with other state law enforcement agencies, many of the standards do not apply to our functions, and some requests were made to change state standards to accommodate state-wide evidence management. In 2010, OALE determined that of the 260 standards in effect at that time, only 203 were applicable.

The Training Section for the Office of Agricultural Law Enforcement, consisting of 1 captain and 1 administrative assistant, coordinates the initial orientation training and the Field Training Program for all new sworn employees. In addition, they design, implement, and oversee the annual in-service training efforts to include required training to maintain law enforcement certificates and maintain compliance with state accreditation standards. This unit also monitors all training received by agency employees, sworn and civilian.

Due to reduced agency staffing, the Training Section has also been assigned equipment and agency property management, coordination of the release of public records requests, review of use of force reports, emergency management (including representation at the State EOC in ESF16 as well as administering the Agency COOP) and coordination of gripes/complaints made against agency employees.

Additional agency employees that are certified instructors are utilized to present training. These employees occasionally assist with training efforts, in addition to their assigned duties. Employees who are not considered members of the Training Section but are certified instructors and the areas in which they are certified are listed below:

In addition to the standard law enforcement training required for maintaining certification, and to remain compliant with State accreditation standards, the following specialized training must be provided to complete the Agency's mission:

Radiation Safety Course for VACIS Operation (VACIS only)

Mobile VACIS Radiological Operator Course (VACIS only)

Field Training Program for New Officers, to include training in vehicle inspections as mandated by sections of FS 570 and Florida Administrative Code 5A-16, food safety inspections, livestock inspections, marketing order compliance for designated fruits and vegetables, Bill of Lading program as mandated by the Department of Revenue, and ammonium nitrate documentation.

Field Training Program for New Investigators, to include training with the following Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services Divisions: Consumer Services training in charitable solicitations, moving companies, motor vehicle repair fraud, telemarketing, and travel agencies; Florida Forest Service training in fire detection, suppression, investigation and prevention, and state lands management; Agricultural Environmental Services training in entomology and pest control, and animal health issues and certifications; and, Aquaculture training in statute-mandated protection of aquaculture products.

The Office of Agricultural Law Enforcement does not have an agency academy.

The Office of Agricultural Law Enforcement does not have any agency-owned training facilities, and must rely on agreements with local and state law enforcement agencies, correction facilities, and facilities provided by Criminal Justice Standards and Training Commission (CJSTC) approved training schools.

The Office of Agricultural Law Enforcement (OALE ) Bureau of Investigative Services (BIS) has two operating sections: the Criminal Investigative Section and the Regulatory Investigative Section. The Criminal Investigative Section includes 34 sworn investigative personnel, 14 uniformed officers, and 1 administrative assistant who is also an FDLE Certified Analyst. The Regulatory Investigative Section includes 12 non-sworn investigators and 1 senior clerk.

BIS's mission is protecting consumers against unfair and deceptive trade practices; protecting the state's diverse agricultural industry from theft and other related crimes; preserving and safeguarding the wholesomeness of food and other consumer products; and protecting the state's natural resources.

BIS is responsible for the investigation of civil and criminal matters over which the Department has jurisdiction and incidents occurring on property owned, managed or controlled by the Department including the enforcement of criminal and civil violations occurring within State Forests. BIS investigates any crimes involving agriculture such as farms or farm equipment, animals, livestock, poultry, and any crimes involving horticulture, aquaculture, or citrus products. BIS is responsible for the investigation of environmental crimes such as illegal dumping, and laws governing outdoor open burning. CIS conducts background investigations of prospective employees of the agency.

The Bureau is engaged in a cooperative partnership with all local, state, and federal agencies providing investigative assistance and support in all matters over which the Department has jurisdiction, and aggressively investigates criminal complaints seeking appropriate judicial intervention to resolve the complaint and prevent future acts of wrong doing.

The Office of Agricultural Law Enforcement supports the various Divisions of the Department in the enforcement of specific statutes as well as the enforcement of other applicable criminal laws. Each Division has separate statutes and administrative rules which govern specific entities they regulate. If requested, more detailed information can be provided regarding each Division, their applicable laws and rules, and the type of incidents commonly requiring BIS assistance.

The Bureau also participates in several programs and specialty units as detailed below:

- STATE AGRICULTURAL RESPONSE TEAM (SART): All sworn personnel are designated as participants in the Agricultural Response Team which is deployed under the direction of the Department.
- CHILD ABDUCTION RESPONSE TEAM (CART): All sworn personnel are designated as regional participants in the Child Abduction Response Team which is under the Direction of FDLE.
- DOMESTIC MARIJUANA ERADICATION PROGRAM: BIS provides assistance in coordination and implementation of sweeps throughout the state, including assignment of personnel to the operations. CARL Officers are an integral of this program.
- DRUG ENFORCEMENT (DEA) TASK FORCE: Due to significant smuggling activity associated with the trucking industry and significant seizures occurring at interdiction stations, BIS has one investigator assigned to the Drug Enforcement Administration Task Force.
- DOMESTIC SECURITY PROGRAMS: BIS actively participates in all seven regional domestic security task forces and planned events.

- IMMIGRATION & CUSTOMS ENFORCEMENT (ICE) AGENTS: BIS has two employees who are cross sworn as Immigration and Customs Enforcement agents strategically located throughout the state who are assigned to terrorism related special response units under the direction of FDLE.
- INFORMATION SHARING: BIS has an FDLE Certified Criminal Analyst who represents the Department/OALE in the FUSION Center at FDLE.
- SECRET SERVICE TASK FORCE: BIS has two investigators who are cross sworn as Secret Service Agents who are assigned to an Economic Crimes Task Force in Central Florida.




